Course description	The course focuses on the current challenges of public administration. The topics start with the classical approach to democratic values and modernization, which are followed by international concepts (globalization and sustainability). The public tasks section deals with the service providing, efficiency, improvement and financing. The bureaucratic part analyzes the transparency, accountability and integrity. Finally, the role of information technology closes the semester.
Learning outcomes and course competences	The course will explore the need for public managers to understand the current challenges of public administration. They acquire a proper method how to identify and analyse complex administrative problems. With the development of their critical and comparative thinking the students will be able to develop proper answers and measures for administrative intervention and improvement taking into consideration the democratic values, globalization and sustainability.
